Preface and Overview

I don't seek out social issue films, but I am proud to be in a movie that will make people think.

-Kevin Spacey, Academy Award-winning actor

Social issues have been depicted on the silver screen since the beginning of the film industry. George Eastman, the founder of Kodak, created flexible celluloid in 1888/89, which was the basis for motion picture film. Then, in 1891, Thomas Edison introduced the kinetoscope, a small peephole viewer for watching short and simple motion pictures. Eastman's creation of celluloid and Edison's kinetoscope helped spawn an era of silent films. Silent films were the only available films in the early 1900s, and it was not until 1929/30 that films with sound became readily available. During the silent film period many films dealt with a variety of social issues. Filmmakers such as George Tucker, Frank Powell, and most notably D.W. Griffith created films pertaining to various social issues like women's rights, divorce, racism, and poverty.

Filmmakers and performers alike have continued to create films that highlight various social issues. Many critics, viewers, and industry people would say that all films have a message, but they are not always noticeable or good. There are films that feature social issues as a primary or central focus, and it is those films that will be detailed in this volume because of their ability to help provoke thought and discussion among viewers.

The primary focus of this volume is to encourage readers to teach with film. Chapter One, "Teaching with Film," provides readers with a researchbased rationale for using film as an instructional tool in the classroom. Additionally, a general model for using film in the classroom, the *Russell Model for Using Film*, is detailed. This four-stage model will help ensure that teachers are utilizing film as an effective instructional tool.

Chapter Two, "Legal Issues," discusses the various legal issues and laws surrounding the use of film in the classroom. Specifically, Chapter Two discusses school district policies and copyright.

Chapter Three, "Teaching Social Issues with Film," discusses the need to teach social issues in the classroom and provides readers with a rationale for teaching social issues. Chapter Three discusses how teachers can use film to enhance the curriculum and increase student interest on various social issues. Furthermore, two different models for teaching social issues with film, the *Traditional Model* and the *Spring Board Model*, are detailed.

Chapter Four, "Evaluating Social Issues Films," discusses how to analyze and evaluate films. This chapter highlights media literacy-related skills and provides readers with generic media literacy questions. In addition, it discusses how teachers can evaluate social issues films and how students can evaluate social issues films.

Social issues are often controversial and divide the public. Social issues films can and will do the same. The majority of this volume is comprised of a filmography of social issues films. Chapter Five, "Filmography of Social Issues Films," is comprised of 180 films, each pertaining to one of the 30 social issues listed in the Table of Contents. The filmography is arranged alphabetically by social issue. Each social issue is explained, followed by a detailed listing of films relevant to the specific social issue. The films are arranged alphabetically by title. Each film entry includes bibliographic information and a film synopsis. Each social issue are listed, but are not detailed.

Each film is grouped by its primary social issue. This volume is intended for teachers at the secondary and college level who are interested in teaching social issues with film. All 180 films were selected based on their relevance to the social issue and availability. Most of the films are available from public libraries or can be rented for a nominal charge from a video store. As well, all social issues films included in this volume are available for purchase on the Internet. Prices for films range from \$.25 to \$25.00 depending on format (VHS vs. DVD) and condition (used vs. new). Many are well under \$10.00, if bought used, through online shopping websites such as Amazon (www.amazon.com). Ideally, this volume will serve as a resource for those interested in promoting discussion, analysis, and critical thinking in the classroom through the examination of social issues using film.

Teaching with Film

Teaching with film is considered a best practice and many consider teaching with film to be an effective strategy for teaching social studies content (Holmes, Russell, & Movitz, 2007; Russell, 2007a; Paris, 1997). Film can help students develop a better understanding of the content by providing visual images. In addition, Matz and Pingatore (2005) explain that film can bring students closer to a topic they are studying. Film is considered to be an effective communicator, and has the potential to arouse emotions (McPherson, in Russell, 2008), and stimulate feelings. With the current population of digital-savvy students, film is an essential part of life and popular culture. An average student spends over 7 hours a day using media. That is over 50 hours a week (Kaiser Family Foundation, 2005). Nearly 50% of student media use per day is exclusively devoted to videos (film) and television, a clear indication of how significant a role film, television, and other media play in a student's day-to-day life.

Film is an enhancement tool for the curriculum, but it is not the curriculum. Film has real-life applications and is relevant to students' everyday lives. Incorporating such a relevant tool into the curriculum can increase

student interest in the material being studied, thus allowing it to become more meaningful and relevant to the student. Furthermore, authentic classroom activities help teachers achieve instructional goals such as retention, understanding, reasoning, and critical thinking (Driscoll, 2005). Not only are critical thinking skills encouraged by authentic film use, but also decision-making skills, especially when dealing with controversial social issues on film. Engle (2003) stressed decision making as the heart of social studies education, stressing that students learn the decision-making process, instead of content memorization. Decision-making skills can be honed by effectively teaching with film. Films help evoke meaningful inquiry of topics, which allows students to make insightful decisions based on what has been viewed and what the teacher does to support the curriculum. For film to be effective it must be used appropriately and not misused or abused.

Film is extremely popular and extremely accessible to students and teachers. In a research study of social studies teachers, 100% reported using film at least once a month to help teach social studies content (Russell, 2007b). In a 2006 study by Stoddard and Marcus, 92.9% of social studies teachers reported using film at least once a week. In 2006, a national survey of social studies teachers reported that 63% of eighth-grade teachers reported using some type of video-based activity in the last social studies class they taught (Leming, Ellington, & Schug, 2006). Additionally, in a national study of teachers, 69% of the teachers reported that they use some type of film/ movie to help teach Holocaust content. The method of using film to teach Holocaust content and the method of using firsthand accounts of the Holocaust were tied for the number one method teachers use (Donnelly, 2006).

The Russell Model for Using Film

The *Russell Model for Using Film* is a four-stage model for utilizing film in the classroom. Many teachers use film and think they use it effectively, but they do not follow the research-based guidelines for using film as laid out in the *Russell Model for Using Film* (see Table 1).

The Russell Model for Using Film

- 1. The Preparation Stage
- 2. The Previewing Stage
- 3. Watching the Film Stage
- 4. The Culminating Activity Stage

Many of the activities that are found in the *Russell Model for Using Film* have been found to help increase student achievement. Allen (1955) found

TABLE 1 The Russell Model for Using Film

Stage One: The Preparation Stage

The preparation stage is the planning stage of the *Russell Model for Using Film*. This stage is also considered the most important stage of the model. The preparation stage includes the following:

Required Activities

- Develop and create a lesson plan that incorporates film, while still meeting instructional goals/objectives and state standards.
- Adhere to all legal requirements.
- Preview the film! Instructors must preview all films before using a film in the classroom.
- Create specific activities needed for each stage (e.g., pre-viewing activity, culminating activity).
- Obtain permission from administration to use the film in the classroom.
- Obtain permission from students' parents/guardians to show the film in the classroom.
- Arrange for appropriate equipment needed (e.g., DVD/VCR player, LCD projector, TV).
- Arrange the classroom for viewing the film.

Stage Two: The Pre-Viewing Stage

The pre-viewing stage is done prior to students viewing the film in class. The previewing stage includes the following:

Required Activities

- Introduce the film to students.
- Discuss the background of the film.
- Explain the purpose for viewing the film.
- Clearly connect the film to the topic/unit currently being studied.
- Introduce new vocabulary.
- Relate the film to students' prior knowledge.
- Relate the film to students' everyday lives.
- Relate the film to other content areas.
- Clarify any significant cinematic terminology (e.g., close-up, voice-over) that may impact the viewers' experience.
- Discuss what is required during the viewing of the film.
- Discuss the culminating activity that will follow the viewing of the film.
- Collect permission slips from parents/guardians. (Ideally, this should be done days/weeks prior to showing the film. Furthermore, administrative permission should be obtained prior to obtaining parent/guardian permission.)

Optional Activities

- Utilize a K-W-L chart: What I Know, What I Want to Know, and What I Learned.
- Read reviews/critiques of the film.
- Read interviews with the star/s, director, producer, etc.
- Have students read a synopsis of the film.

Stage Three: Watching the Film Stage

Watching the film stage is where students actually view the film. Showing the entire film is appropriate when necessary, as is showing small segments or clips. Research has been shown to support both types of film use. Stopping the film occasionally to highlight an important point, concept, issue, and/or scene is appropriate. The watching the film stage includes the following:

Required Activity

• Watch the film.

Optional Activities

- Have students take notes. (If notes are required, the teacher must provide ample light and time for writing the notes.)
- Complete a guided activity. (Some films have premade guided activities.)
- Answer questions created by the teacher.

Stage Four: The Culminating Activity Stage

The culminating activity stage is done after students have watched the film. The culminating activity stage includes the following:

Required Activities

- Stop the film.
- Review, clarify, and/or discuss major points, concepts, issues, scenes, and/or inaccuracies.
- Assess student learning (see assessment strategies).

Optional Assessment Strategies

- Class discussion
- Class debate
- Rewrite the ending of the film
- Write a review of the film
- Take a test/quiz
- Complete a written assignment aligned with the film and topic/unit
- Reenactment (have students reenact a scene from the film)
- Have students conduct a mock interview with the star, director, and/or producer of the film
- Have students analyze and evaluate the film

that if teachers announce a test during the previewing stage that students will learn more than those who were unaware of the test prior to showing the film. Allen also found that if teachers introduce and prepare the class for a film during the previewing stage, students retained more content information than students who did not receive the same introduction and preparation. Thus, it is crucial to make students aware of the requirements and clearly explain and clarify expectations. Informing students of expectations will help ensure the students' success. By using the *Russell Model for Using Film*, teachers will help ensure that film is used to *enhance* the curriculum, not *as* the curriculum. Furthermore, teachers will help ensure that film is used appropriately and legally. The *Russell Model for Using Film* should be used as a guide; however, teachers still need to make sure that all professional, ethical, and legal standards are upheld.

Legal Issues

Many teachers use film in the classroom; however, they are unaware of the legal issues surrounding its appropriate use. It is extremely crucial that teachers understand and follow the law when using copyrighted materials. The two main legal issues surrounding the use of film in the classroom are (1) school/school district policies and regulations and (2) copyright.

School/district policies and regulations should be upheld. Since policies and regulations change from school to school and district to district, teachers need to check with school/district administrators to obtain the policies and regulations for using film in the classroom.

As stated above, policies and regulations for using film in the classroom change from school to school and district to district. A basic policy for using film in the classroom will be similar to the following:

- 1. All films must be used in the classroom for instructional purposes.
- 2. Films with a rating of "G" may be used for instructional purposes with teacher approval and administrative permission.

- 3. Films with a rating of "PG" may be used for instructional purposes with teacher approval, administrative permission, and parent/guardian permission.
- 4. Films with a rating of "PG-13" may be used for instructional purposes with teacher approval, administrative permission, and parent/guardian permission.
- 5. Films with a rating of "R" and/or higher cannot be shown. (See Appendix A for a detailed explanation of the MPAA film ratings.)

This basic policy is not applicable to all schools and/or school districts. Many times school districts will allow films with a rating of "R" to be used with approval from the school board. R-rated films that are commonly approved by school boards are *Schindler's List* and *Glory*.

Federal copyright laws are established by the United States Copyright Office. Section 110 (1) of Title 17 of the United States Code on Copyright and Conditions cites the following exemption for the use of copyrighted films for educational purposes:

Performance or display of a work by instructors or pupils in the course of faceto-face teaching activities of a nonprofit educational institution, in a classroom or similar place devoted to instruction, unless in the case of a motion picture or other audiovisual work, the performance, or the display of individual images, is given by means of a copy that was not lawfully made under this title, and that the person responsible for the performance knew or had reason to believe was not lawfully made. (www.copyright.gov/title17/92chap1.html#110)

Simply put, a film must be used in a nonprofit educational institution, in an instructional class that is meeting face-to-face, and for educational purposes, not for entertainment or recreation. As well, educators can use a film that has been rented at a video store, borrowed from a library, and/or purchased, as long as the above regulations are adhered to.

Teachers should not make copies of films, use films as public performance, and/or make a profit from showing films. However, teachers can make copies of public television programs for educational use in the classroom. This practice is covered under the fair use code of copyrighted material. What is fair use? Section 107 of Title 17 (1) of the United States Code on Copyright and Conditions explains the fair use guidelines for the use of copyrighted materials for educational purposes:

Notwithstanding the provisions of sections 106 and 106A, the fair use of a copyrighted work, including such use by reproduction in copies or phonorecords or by any other means specified by that section, for purposes such as criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching (including multiple copies for classroom use), scholarship, or research, is not an infringement of copyright. In determining whether the use made of a work in any particular case is a fair use the factors to be considered shall include—

- the purpose and character of the use, including whether such use is of a commercial nature or is for nonprofit educational purposes;
- the nature of the copyrighted work;
- the amount and substantiality of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole; and
- the effect of the use upon the potential market for or value of the copy-righted work

The complete United States Code on Copyright and Conditions can be accessed via the Internet at www.copyright.gov/title17/.

Furthermore, to qualify as fair use, the Federal Guidelines for Off-Air Recording of Broadcast Programming for Educational Purposes (U.S. Government, 1981) should be adhered to. Those guidelines are as follows:

- 1. The guidelines were developed to apply only to off-air recording by nonprofit educational institutions.
- 2. A broadcast program may be recorded off-air simultaneously with broadcast transmission—(including simultaneous cable re-transmission) and retained by a nonprofit educational institution for a period not to exceed the first forty-five (45) consecutive calendar days after date of recording. Upon conclusion of such retention period, all off-air recordings must be ceased or destroyed immediately. "Broadcast programs" are television programs transmitted by television stations for reception by the general public without charge.
- 3. Off-air recordings may be used by individual teachers in the course of relevant teaching activities, and repeated once only when instructional reinforcement is necessary, in classrooms and similar places devoted to instruction within a single building, cluster, or campus, as well as in the homes of students receiving formalized home instruction, during the first ten (10) consecutive school days in the forty-five (45) calendar day retention period. "School days" are school session days—not counting weekends, holidays, vacations, examination periods, or other scheduled interruptions—within the forty-five (45) calendar day retention period.
- 4. Off-air recordings may be made only at the request of and used by individual teachers, and may not be regularly recorded in anticipation of requests. No broadcast program may be recorded off-air

more than once at the request of the same teacher, regardless of the number of times the program may be broadcast.

- 5. A limited number of copies may be reproduced from each off-air recording to meet the legitimate needs of teachers under these guidelines. Each such additional copy shall be subject to all provisions governing the original recording.
- 6. After the first ten (10) consecutive school days, off-air recordings may be used up to the end of the forty-five (45) calendar day retention period only for teacher evaluation purposes, i.e., to determine whether or not to include the broadcast program in the teaching curriculum, and may not be used in the recording institution for student exhibition or any other non-evaluation purpose without authorization.
- 7. Off-air recordings need not be used in their entirety, but the recorded programs may not be altered from their original content. Off-air recordings may not be physically or electronically combined or merged to constitute teaching anthologies or compilations.
- 8. All copies of off-air recordings must include the copyright notice on the broadcast programs as recorded.
- Educational Institutions are expected to establish the appropriate control procedures to maintain the integrity of these guidelines. (p. E4750–E4752)

Teaching Social Issues with Film

Questions unite, answers divide —Elie Wiesel

The practice of teaching social issues is often regarded as a best practice. However, teaching social issues is often a practice that teachers tend not to utilize. Typically, teachers shy away from social issues because they are often controversial in nature. Although controversial, the teaching of social issues is a powerful and effective method of instruction. As well, teaching controversial issues is a highly regarded and encouraged practice when done appropriately. The National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS; 2007) states the following:

Controversial issues must be studied in the classroom without the assumption that they are settled in advance or there is only one right answer in matters of dispute. The social studies teacher must approach such issues in a spirit of critical inquiry exposing the students to a variety of ideas, even if they are different from their own.

Furthermore, the National Council for the Social Studies outlines the following specific skills and attitudes that are developed through the study of controversial social issues:

- 1. The ability to study relevant social problems of the past or present and make informed decisions or conclusions;
- 2. The ability to use critical reasoning and evidence-based evaluation in the study and analysis of significant issues and ideas; this includes development of skills of critical analysis and evaluation in considering ideas, opinions, information, and sources of information;
- 3. The recognition that differing viewpoints are valuable and normal as a part of social discourse;
- 4. The recognition that reasonable compromise is often an important part of the democratic decision-making process.

No matter the position of the National Council for the Social Studies, many classroom teachers eliminate controversial social issues from the curriculum. Byford, Lennon, and Russell (2008) explained that teachers tend not to teach controversial subjects because (1) teachers lack the appropriate classroom management skills, (2) restrictive school/district policies, (3) the teachers' comfort level of discussing various issues, and (4) job security. Levitt and Longstreet (1993) explain that many teachers consider teaching controversial issues a "no-win" situation, because once the controversial issues reflect reality, the results could be counterproductive to students. In addition, Cotton (2006) concluded that teachers found difficulty in avoiding stating opinions themselves or becoming actively involved in the argument and debate.

The teaching of controversial social issues is not only met with trepidation by teachers, but also by pre-service teachers. Misco and Patterson (2007) reported that many pre-service teachers are uncomfortable teaching controversial issues related to sexual orientation, sexual harassment, and/ or religion. The teaching of controversial social issues is almost nonexistent in many classrooms. Kahne, Rodriguez, Smith, and Thiede (2000) observed 8th- and 10th-grade social studies classes and found an almost complete absence of opportunities for students to discuss and analyze controversial social issues. Byford and colleagues (2008) examined high school social studies teachers (N= 67) and concluded that 75% reported that controversial issues should be taught; however, over 65% reported feeling unable to effectively teach controversial issues. This is because many teachers do not know how to effectively teach controversial social issues and they do not have the appropriate resources available to effectively teach controversial material, such as social issues films.

Controversial social issues can be an effective teaching tool in the classroom. Examining controversial social issues can help students learn to deal with conflict and take on life's leadership roles (Soley, 1996), and may teach students to clarify and justify their opinions on a number of issues. In today's society, students are often unable to justify their own opinions and debate various issues with rational reasoning. When dealing with political and social issues students typically accept their parents and/or close relatives' opinions and views as their own, without giving any real thought to the issues at hand (Russell, 2004). Teaching controversial social issues allows students to be actively engaged in the curriculum and allows the issues to become more meaningful and relevant to students' everyday lives (McGowan, McGowan, & Lumbard, 1994; Torney-Purta, Lehman, Oswald, & Schulz, 2002). Additionally, discussing controversial social issues can help students develop critical decision-making skills, and decision making is considered the heart of social studies education (Engle, 2003).

Social issues films should not be used as the final authority on an issue, but more as a tool to promote discussion and thinking about an issue. For example, when *Bowling for Columbine* was released, many people started asking questions about school violence, gun control, and the Second Amendment. Whether the movie accurately informed viewers is up for debate. However, what is not debatable is the fact that the film inspired viewers to think and discuss the issues at hand. Classroom teachers should not be concerned with promoting their personal political and/or social agenda, because this often gets teachers in trouble and can be detrimental to students. Instead, teachers should encourage basic decision-making skills and focus on the process of examining social issues, not necessarily the outcome.

To help ensure appropriate film use, refer to the *Russell Model for Using Film* in Chapter Two. The *Russell Model* should be used in conjunction with the following two models when teaching social issues with film. Due to the controversial nature and the need for specialized instruction, teaching social issues needs to be treated slightly differently than other curriculum. The following two models will ensure that teachers effectively teach social issues with film.

The Traditional Model (see Table 2) allows teachers to establish the curriculum and utilize a social issue film as a means to teach social issues. The *Traditional Model* uses a social issue film as a visually stimulating tool and a visual information source. Oftentimes the curriculum plan will include specific assignments and/or discussions relating directly to the film. However,

TABLE 2 The Traditional Model for Teaching Social Issues with Film

Phase One: Orientation

- The social issue is presented to students.
- Various stances on the issue are presented.
- The film is introduced using the procedures outlined in Stage 2 of the *Russell Model for Using Film.*

Phase Two: View Social Issue Film

- Students view the social issue film (whole film or clips of film can be used).
- Students complete film viewing activity (optional).

Phase Three: Self-Reflection

- Students reflect upon their own views.

this is not a requirement. Typically, the entire film or a moderately sized section of the film is viewed. However, this depends on the teacher, the lesson objectives, and the students' individual needs.

The *Spring Board Model* (see Table 3) utilizes social issues films differently than the *Traditional Model*. In this model, social issues films or film clips are used as a way to introduce a social issue. The film's depiction of the social issue will heighten student interest with the issue and promote active participation. Typically, when using the *Spring Board Model* teachers only utilize brief film clips, instead of the entire film. However, there are instances when the entire film would be appropriate. This depends on the teacher, the lesson objectives, and the students' individual needs.

Although not specified, Stage One: The Preparation Stage of the Russell Model for Using Film should be adhered to when implementing the Traditional Model and/or the Spring Board Model.

Evaluating Social Issues Films

Evaluating Social Issues Films

Using film as an instructional teaching method is a common practice. However, film education is not common. Teachers are not prepared to effectively use film as an instructional tool and students are not prepared to effectively view films and make informed decisions with regards to the content of the film. In a recent study, 100% of social studies teachers reported using film at least once a month. As well, 51% reported using film at least two to three times a month, some even reported using film four to five times a month or six or more times a month (Russell, 2007b). Despite the abundance of film use, the majority of teachers have never been properly trained to use film effectively and appropriately.

A simple and effective way to prepare teachers and students to utilize film is for them to become media literate. Media literacy is a major component of teaching social issues with film. Becoming media literate helps individuals become more informed citizens. Many films, along with other types of media (print and nonprint) can influence an individual's attitudes, beliefs, and/or values. The influence is so strong it is often not repudiated and the information is deemed accurate and creditable. Thus individuals adopt the

information as their own, without truly exploring the topic and making their own informed decision. Social issues films, like other types of media, should not be used as a final authority. Instead, the films should be used to promote critical thinking and discussion. Incorporating media literacy components into lessons that utilize film enables students to gain a more comprehensive understanding with regards to the film and the content.

Media Literacy

Media literacy is one of the most important skills for teachers and students to obtain. It is an essential aspect of any lesson that utilizes film or any other type of media. Media literacy is simply the ability to analyze and evaluate all types of media. However, a more specific and robust definition has been developed by the Center for Media Literacy (CML). The CML (2009a) states:

Media Literacy is a 21st century approach to education. It provides a framework to access, analyze, evaluate and create messages in a variety of forms from print to video to the Internet. Media literacy builds an understanding of the role of media in society as well as essential skills of inquiry and selfexpression necessary for citizens of a democracy.

Furthermore, teaching students media literacy skills have numerous benefits including the following outlined by the Center for Media Literacy (2009b):

- 1. Meets the needs of students to be wise consumers of media, managers of information and responsible producers of their ideas using the powerful multimedia tools of a global media culture.
- 2. **Engages students**... bringing the world of media into the classroom connects learning with "real life" and validates their media culture as a rich environment for learning.
- 3. Gives students and teachers alike a common approach to critical thinking that, when internalized, becomes second nature for life.
- 4. **Provides an opportunity for integrating all subject areas** and creating a common vocabulary that applies across all disciplines.
- 5. Helps meet state standards while, at the same time using fresh contemporary media content which students love.
- 6. **Increases the ability and proficiency of students** to communicate (express) and disseminate their thoughts and ideas in a wide (and growing) range of print and electronic media forms—and even international venues.

- 7. **Media literacy's "inquiry process" transforms teaching** and frees the teacher to learn along with students—becoming a "guide on the side" rather than a "sage on the stage."
- 8. By focusing on process skills rather than content knowledge, students gain the ability to analyze *any* message in *any* media and thus are empowered for living all their lives in a media-saturated culture.

These skills will enable teachers and students to appropriately analyze and evaluate various forms of media, which will help move the learning process beyond the rote memorization of facts.

To become media literate is not to memorize facts or statistics about the media, but rather to learn to raise the right questions about what you are watching, reading or listening to. (CML, 2009c)

This questioning ability that media literacy promotes will prove valuable in the classroom and in life. Helping students ask questions and think critically, which are key components to the decision-making process.

Teacher Evaluation of Social Issues Films

Evaluating social issues films needs to be done at two different levels. The first level of evaluation is for the teacher. Teachers need to be able to analyze and evaluate social issues films for educational appropriateness, potential, value, and relevance. Evaluating for educational appropriateness should be as simple as using common sense. As stated in Stage One of the *Russell Model for Using Film* (see Table 1), teachers need to ensure that they are adhering to the school/district guidelines for using film in the classroom. Teachers also need to be sure to obtain administrative and parental permission. Evaluating social issues films for educational potential, value, and relevance is more subjective to the individual instructor and the individual needs and abilities of the students. When evaluating social issues films, teachers should view the film and determine its educational value. The educational value needs to fit the curriculum and the needs of the students. The more relevant the film and instruction, the more meaningful and powerful the lesson will be.

To help teachers evaluate films for educational potential, it is recommended that the Film Analysis Sheet (see Appendix B) be utilized. This is a generic form that can be utilized with most films.

Student Evaluation of Social Issues Films

Once the teacher evaluates a film and decides to implement it into the curriculum, the evaluation process shifts to the students. However, before students can effectively analyze and evaluate films, they need to be trained.

Training students to evaluate film is the foundation for successfully learning from film. Students need to understand basic film terminology (see Appendix C) and media literacy skills. To help sharpen students' media literacy skills, use the following "Media Literacy Questions." These are generic media literacy questions that can be used for any film and can be tailored for other types of media.

- Who made this film?
- When was this film created?
- What is the purpose of this film?
- Who supported/sponsored this film?
- What is the target audience of this film?
- How is this film made for that audience?
- What cinematic techniques were used?
- Why were these techniques used?
- What is this film implying or saying about the issue, event, person, place, etc., that is being portrayed?
- What is missing from this film?

These questions are simple, but powerful. To demonstrate how these questions work, here are a few examples:

- Example 1: *Schindler's List.* Who made this film? Steven Spielberg. When explored, this answer provides a great deal of information. It is a well-known fact that Steven Spielberg is Jewish. This could impact the film's depiction of specific issues, people, events, and/or time periods.
- Example 2: *The Passion of the Christ.* Who made this film? Mel Gibson. When explored, this answer provides a great deal of information. It is well documented that Mel Gibson is a devoted Catholic and has publicly demonstrated prejudice toward Jewish people. This could impact the film's depiction of the specific issues, people, events, and/or time periods.

These questions help bring to the surface issues, concerns, and/or possible bias held within and around the film. It is this questioning ability that allows individuals to make their own informed decisions. By asking media literacy-type questions students will gain a more clear and comprehensive understanding of the film.

It should be noted that creating a feature-length film is considered an art. Films are written, directed, acted, and produced by people that have different attitudes, beliefs, and values. By training students to read the film, students will be better prepared to analyze and evaluate the film and decipher what is meaningful and what is not. Included in the analysis and evaluation of social issues films is the need for students to understand basic film terminology. By understanding film terminology, students will have a better grasp of various cinematic techniques that directors use to engage and influence viewers. Whether it is as common and recognizable as music, or as complex as fancy editing techniques, either way, understanding basic film terminology will strengthen students' ability to analyze and evaluate film. For a list of film terminology, see Appendix C.

Filmography of Social Issues Films

The filmography of social issues films is simply a list of films pertaining to various social issues. This filmography does not include every film ever made that deals with social issues, but rather it does include films that clearly depict or relate to a specific social issue. Furthermore, all 180 films were selected based on their relevance to the social issue, instructional use, and availability. The majority of the films can be found at a local video rental store or can be purchased from an online store (e.g., www.amazon.com) for a nominal price.

This filmography includes feature-length films and documentaries. Films categorized as home movies, government films, and educational films have been excluded from this filmography. Each film is grouped by its primary social issue; however, many of the films provided deal with multiple social issues. This volume is intended for teachers at the secondary and college level who are interested in teaching social issues with film. The social issues are arranged alphabetically and a brief definition/explanation of the social issue is provided. Each social issue details six films, arranged alphabetically by title. However, other films pertaining to the social issue

are listed, but not detailed. Each film entry includes a film synopsis and the following bibliographic information: year, genre, Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) rating, alternative title/s, director, producer, writer, length, language, color, company, and cast.

Some of the films detailed in this volume may not be appropriate to show in full in a secondary classroom. Ultimately, teachers must determine the appropriateness and educational value of the film for their instructional needs. Thus, teachers need to ensure that they are adhering to school/district procedures related to teaching with film. As with any type of classroom instruction, teachers need to ensure that the curriculum and instruction meets the learning goals/objectives of the lesson and the individual needs of the students.

Abortion

Abortion, simply put, is the removal of a fetus or embryo from a woman's uterus. The removal can be done medically, surgically, or by other means. Currently abortion is one of the most controversial social issues in society. The issue is divided into pro-life and pro-choice regimes. Although many are torn on the issue, abortion is an important topic during the election of government officials and among religious groups. Films relevant to this topic can pertain to other social issues, such as women's rights and teen pregnancy. However, these social issues are handled separately in this chapter.

Other films dealing with abortion not detailed in this volume include: Blue Denim (1955), The Cardinal (1963), Cider House Rules (1999), Detective Story (1951), Finn's Girl (2007), The Interns (1962), Leona's Sister Gerri (1995), Live Free or Die (2000), Patty (1962), Prophecy (1979), Rosita (2005), To Find a Man (1972), Unborn in the USA: Inside the War on Abortion (2007), and 10 Rillingon Place (1971).

Addiction

Genocide can be defined as "any of the following acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnical, racial or religious group, as such: (a) Killing members of the group; (b) Causing serious bodily or mental harm to members of the group; (c) Deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its physical destruction in whole or in part; (d) Imposing measures intended to prevent births within the group; (e) Forcibly transferring children of the group to another group" (United Nations, 1948, Article 2). Genocide-related events have often been depicted in films. The large majority of films pertaining to genocide portray the atrocities of the Holocaust. However, there have been and/or currently are other genocides that need to be examined, such as Armenian genocide, the atrocities in Rwanda, and genocide in Darfur.

Film Ratings



A G-rated motion picture contains nothing in theme, language, nudity, sex, violence, or other matters that, in the view of the Rating Board, would offend parents whose younger children view the motion picture. The G rating is not a "certificate of approval," nor does it signify a "children's" motion picture. Some snippets of language may go beyond polite conversation but they are common everyday expressions. No strong language is present in G-rated motion pictures. Depictions of violence are minimal. No nudity, sex scenes, or drug use are present in the motion picture.



A PG-rated motion picture should be investigated by parents before they let their younger children attend. The PG rating indicates, in the view of the

Rating Board, that parents may consider some material unsuitable for their children, and parents should make that decision.

The more mature themes in some PG-rated motion pictures may call for parental guidance. There may be some profanity and some depictions of violence or brief nudity, but these elements are not deemed so intense as to require that parents be strongly cautioned beyond the suggestion of parental guidance. There is no drug use content in a PG-rated motion picture.



A PG-13 rating is a sterner warning by the Rating Board to parents to determine whether their children under age 13 should view the motion picture, as some material might not be suitable for them. A PG-13 motion picture may go beyond the PG rating in theme, violence, nudity, sensuality, language, adult activities, or other elements, but does not reach the restricted R category. The theme of the motion picture by itself will not result in a rating greater than PG-13, although depictions of activities related to a mature theme may result in a restricted rating for the motion picture. Any drug use will initially require at least a PG-13 rating. More than brief nudity will require at least a PG-13 rating, but such nudity in a PG-13-rated motion picture generally will not be sexually oriented. There may be depictions of violence in a PG-13 movie, but generally not both realistic and extreme or persistent violence. A motion picture's single use of one of the harsher sexually derived words, though only as an expletive, initially requires at least a PG-13 rating. More than one such expletive requires an R rating, as must even one of those words used in a sexual context. The Rating Board nevertheless may rate such a motion picture PG-13 if, based on a special vote by a two-thirds majority, the raters feel that most American parents would believe that a PG-13 rating is appropriate because of the context or manner in which the words are used or because the use of those words in the motion picture is inconspicuous.



An R-rated motion picture, in the view of the Rating Board, contains some adult material. An R-rated motion picture may include adult themes, adult activity, hard language, intense or persistent violence, sexually oriented nudity, drug abuse, or other elements, so that parents are counseled to take this rating very seriously. Children under age 17 are not allowed to attend R-rated motion pictures unaccompanied by a parent or adult guardian. Parents are strongly urged to find out more about R-rated motion pictures in determining suitability for their children. Generally, it is not appropriate for parents to bring their young children with them to R-rated motion pictures.

An NC-17-rated motion picture is one that, in the view of the Rating Board, most parents would consider patently too adult for their children age 17 and under. No children will be admitted. NC-17 does not mean "obscene" or "pornographic" in the common or legal meaning of those words, and should not be construed as a negative judgment in any sense. The rating simply signals that the content is appropriate only for an adult audience. An NC-17 rating can be based on violence, sex, aberrational behavior, drug abuse, or any other element that most parents would consider too strong and therefore off-limits for viewing by their children.

Film Terminology

- Audio: The sound portion of the film.
- **Background Music:** Music that accompanies a scene, but not coming from a specific source in the scene.
- **Boom:** A long pole used to hold a camera or microphone.
- **Camera Angle:** The angle in which the camera is pointed (e.g., high-angle shot).
- Clip: A short segment of a film.
- **Close-up:** A shot in which an individual's head fills the frame.
- **Computerized Graphic Imaging** (CGI): Special effects created by a computer and added to the film.
- **Crane Shot:** A camera angle or shot taken from a boom, which allows both horizontal and vertical movement.
- **Cross-cutting:** The method of editing two or more scenes together to portray events that are occurring simultaneously.
- **Deep Focus:** The foreground and background are both in focus simultaneously.
- **Director:** The individual in charge of all aspects of making the film.

- **Dissolve:** To fade from one shot while fading in to another shot.
- **Dolly Shot:** A camera shot from a dolly (a camera moving on wheels).
- Editing: The process on splicing individual shots together to make a film.
- **Editor:** The individual in charge of splicing the shots together to make a film.
- **Establishing Shot:** A shot that introduces the viewers to the scene.
- **Extreme Close-up:** A shot in which a small detail (e.g., an eyeball) fills the frame.
- **Extreme Long Shot:** A shot in which an individual looks small compared to the landscape in the frame.
- Fade: To fade the shot to a black screen or fade a black screen to a shot.
- **Fast Motion:** The movements appear to move at a much faster speed than in real life.
- **Flashback:** A part of the film that deviates from the chronological order and shifts to the past.
- **Flash Forward:** A part of the film that deviates from the chronological order and shifts to the future.
- **Focus:** The sharpness and clarity of an image on the screen.
- Frame: The rectangle image projected on the screen.
- **Freeze Frame:** The freezing or stopping of an individual frame.
- Genre: The type of film (e.g., drama, biography, or comedy).
- **High-Angle Shot:** A shot from above, which creates a feeling of looking down upon the subject.
- Jump Cut: The instant transition from one shot to another.
- **Lip Sync:** The process of aligning the vocals to the actor's mouth movement (aka dubbing).
- **Long Shot:** An entire individual fills the frame.
- **Low-Angle Shot:** A shot from below, which creates a feeling of looking up at the subject.
- **Medium Long Shot:** A shot in which an individual, from the knees up, fills the frame.
- **Medium Shot:** A shot in which an individual, from the waist up, fills the frame.
- **Pan Shot:** The horizontal movement of a shot from side to side.

- **Point-of-View Shot:** A shot from the point of view of one of the subjects in the shot.
- **Rack-Focus:** The camera switches focus between either the background or foreground.
- Scene: Multiple shots united by time and space edited together.
- Sequence: Multiple scenes untied by time edited together.
- **Shot:** A continuous piece of filming with interruption.
- **Slow Motion:** The movements appear to move at a much slower speed than in real life.
- **Tilt Shot:** An up-or-down shot from a stationary camera.
- Voiceover: Narration from a character or narrator that is not seen.
- **Zoom:** The adjustment of the camera lens to bring the images closer or farther away.
